Dear Families,



Debbie had been the director of Project Prepare for 13 years where she took all that she knew about programing, kids loves, talents we had on our staff, her love and experiences in theater and put it all together to create an unbelievable program. From Circus Arts to Improv to Dance Classes and empty bowls, Debbie stretched herself to create opportunities in areas she loved, and areas new to her. If someone had an idea, she would pull them in and help them create their dream. Whether that was Garden club, Chess club, Soccer club, Peace Jam club, or even a club to plan a Halloween party for the school, she helped to nourish the idea, figured out how to make it work, and executed the plan.

Debbie's work will continue to live on in the murals from Summer Arts Camp, the continuation of Project Prepare, our Foster Folklorico and Mariachi groups, the Tamale throwdown, affordable before and after school care for our students, and the beautiful garden she nurtured, loved for so many years. She turned a grant funded venture into a sustainable program that we will continue to celebrate and keep going for years to come.

We will work together to continue Debbie's work and passion as we continue to help Project Prepare flourish.

Hello 2nd grade families!

Wow! Can you believe October is already gone? What a wonderful time we are having this fall with your kids. They have shown growth in respecting their peace promises, and their commitment to learning in the classroom.

In writing, they started to explore many different kinds of poetry, and continue working on personal narrations.

In reading, they are using comprehension strategies such as predicting, visualizing, questioning, and inferring using text evidence to support their thoughts.

In math, students finished unit 1 solving addition and subtraction word problems showing their work with visualizations, equations, strategies, and justifying their thinking.

Last month we decided to continue our work in Social Studies with Geography in October. We learned about maps and globes and the different terms and tools we use to understand people and places.

This coming month, during science, we will have our first "Project Based Learning" experience. We will explore different habitats, and we will answer the question "How do environments help plants and animals meet their basic needs for survival?"

Report cards will be sent home on November 16th. As always, please reach out with any questions or concerns. We thank you for coming to conferences and our Halloween celebration.

Hello third grade families,

Thank you very much for attending conferences and taking time to strengthen our partnership in supporting your students! If you were unable to attend a conference, please contact us so we can schedule a meeting. Also, thank you so much to the friends, families, and community members who contributed their time and money to the Fun Run! We so appreciate all of the support!

In Reading, the class became experts on characters and fictional story structure. In our next unit, we are exploring nonfiction texts and their "nuts and bolts." Students will be using their knowledge of nonfiction text features to understand how they impact the way we interpret texts as readers.

Writing is transitioning from narrative storytelling into writing to explain. Our connection between reading and writing is strong as we can use our nonfiction texts to explain new concepts!

In Math, students are developing fluency with 2's, 5's, 9's, and 10's. We also have been working on strategies for multiplication, the properties, and word problems. Next, we will be working on all of the other facts along with division of these same facts. Please study for at least ten minutes at home nightly to learn multiplication facts by heart. This is so important to prepare students for the rest of third grade and moving on into fourth and beyond.

In Science, we got to see our caterpillars grow into butterflies and see them fly away while studying Life Cycles of plants and animals. Our next content unit will be discovering the Big City and all of its components in Social Studies. This unit will include a PBL using current events, such as Arvada's growth with the arrival of the Light Rail.

Please be on the lookout for more information about opportunities to bring our learning to life (personal connections, field trips, etc)!

All students now have access to their school iPads for learning at school. As devices begin or continue to come home, please help your child understand that their devices are for learning purposes. Please do not enter an Apple ID on the device as this causes issues for our device management system. Apps approved for student use can be found in Self-Service from the

iPad. School devices should not have access to the Apple Store; if your child's device does allow access, please let us know. It is appreciated if you can avoid entering a passcode on the device as students often forget the secret code which creates access issues. Thank you for all you do to assist your child in using their school device in a safe and thoughtful manner.

If your child's device is not working for any reason (charging, sound, internet connection, etc.), please alert your child's teacher as a first step. Please make sure devices are returned to school


each day fully charged with the full case in place. We ask students to ALWAYS have the hard cover in place to protect the glass screen whenever they are transporting their school iPads.

Students are now visiting the library on a weekly basis for checkout. Students may check out two books (grades 1-6) for two weeks. Kindergarteners check out one book per week. You will receive overdue notices for books that have been checked out for longer than two weeks. Please assist your child with returning books on time. Lost books may be paid for in the library.

Our second graders recently completed the Cognitive Abilities Test as a part of our universal screening. The results of this assessment are used to understand students' learning strengths and weaknesses and plan for appropriate instruction. Families will receive results of this assessment later this year.



Thanks to all who participated in our Book Fair. We appreciated the parent and student volunteers who gave of their time to make this a successful fundraising event. Proceeds are used for school needs such as technology, curriculum support, and Battle of the Books titles for students.





I'm Keith Harms and I am your new Elementary Band Instructor for the Arvada Articulation Area. I am very excited to meet and get to know all of you throughout this school year. I have over 35 years of teaching experience. In addition to my teaching skills, my professional performance experience includes; studio work, concert performances, clinician work and music composition.

I teach at nine schools and meet with the Beginning Band twice a week and the 6th Grade Advanced Band Every Day. Each class is for 40 minutes then I rush off to the next school!

For the past few weeks, the beginning band 5th graders have begun the journey of learning to play a band instrument. During this time, they have been discovering how to hold, put together and get a sound on their particular instrument. Your child may at times feel discouraged, but reassure them that they will get better. Just keep working! The Advanced Band will be receiving band folders with music very soon.

Please Note:

<u>Clarinet and Sax Students are required to have extra reeds at all times</u>. Reeds break easily, especially with beginning students. Reed Strength is NO. 2. Without a reed they can't play the instrument.

As you know; this is a very big decision and commitment by both the child and the rest of the household is very important. Enforcing plenty of practice time (around 15 minutes a day) and giving ample encouragement to your child, especially when obstacles arise, can be a golden opportunity for all involved to draw even closer to one another.

Hello wonderful Foster families!

Now that the cold weather is upon us I wanted to share some general guidelines to keep in mind to help our community stay healthy throughout the winter.

The CDC recommends taking just 3 simple actions to fight the flu:

- 1. <u>Take time to get a flu vaccine</u>. Everyone 6 months of age and older should get a flu vaccine every year before flu activity begins in their community. Vaccination of high risk persons (young children, pregnant women, people over age 65 and those with chronic health conditions like asthma) is extremely important.
- 2. Take everyday preventative actions to stop the spread of germs. Avoid contact with sick people. While sick limit your contact with others and always cover your cough! Wash your hands often with soap and water. Stay home if you are sick, if you have a fever please stay home until you are fever free for 24 hours without the use of fever reducing drugs. Avoid touching your eyes, nose and mouth, as germs spread easily this way.
- 3. <u>Take flu antiviral drugs if your doctor prescribes them.</u> Antiviral drugs can make illness milder and shorten the time you are sick; they may also prevent serious complications.

Flu symptoms include: fever, cough, sore throat, runny or stuffy nose, body aches, headache, chills and fatigue. Some people may also have vomiting and diarrhea.
