Principal's Page

Dear Foster Families,

Time for Parent/Teacher conferences! Our conferences will take place October 8th and 10th from 4:00-8:00 PM by appointment. This is an important time where parents and quardians are able to connect with the teacher of their child to learn how students are doing in school both academically and socially. Please be sure to schedule an appointment with your child's teacher if you have not done so. Information will be sent from your child's teacher. We are also trying to keep parents in the know at a deeper level with progress reports and you should have received one in the last two weeks. If not, please check with the classroom teacher about this.

In terms of changes for Foster in the coming year, we continue to have meetings at the District level to determine what that will look like. After a meeting with our superintendent Dr. Glass, we are now set to present to the school board and ask for a vote on Foster becoming a Dual Language PK-8 Option school. This would include a change in boundary for our school creating two choices of neighborhood schools for our

neighborhood students, Foster Dual Language K-8 or Secrest and Swanson, depending on where families reside and inclusive of transportation. We would not offer Traditional Kindergarten or 6th grade next school year, and then no longer offer Traditional at all starting in 2021-22. We want to give families time to make this transition and will help with this process along the way. Students in the historic Foster neighborhood will continue to have priority for enrollment at Foster through the choice enrollment process indefinitely. Our hope is to have the final decisions by November 7th so that families can plan accordingly.

At Foster, we celebrate Halloween with a parade through the school at 3:00 and then a small party in the classroom. This will take place in the afternoon of October 31st. If your child does not celebrate Halloween, we will have different activities in the library for them to do.

This is an event for students grades K-7, so we have some straightforward and non-negotiable rules that **must be fol**lowed:

- Students will have a regular day until 2:45 when they will be allowed to change into costumes. Do not have your child come to school in costume or with make-up on as they will have to remove it.
- Scary masks are not allowed. If students bring a mask we feel is too scary for Kindergarten students, we will not allow the student to wear it. Ms. Shari and I are happy to let students know if a mask is ok or not ahead of time, so please be proactive.
- No blood or fake weapons allowed.
- Adults are not allowed to dress in clown costumes.

Healthy snacks are encouraged for the class parties. Please remember not to bring snacks with nuts as we have numerous children with nut allergies.

Halloween is a fun community event at Foster. Please be sure to follow the rules so that we can be sure everyone has a great time!

Halloween at Foster

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September has been a busy month! We completed our introduction to our Peace Promises. We launched our literacy rotations. And of course, we had a whole lot of fun at Field Day!

October will welcome our second units of the year: In Reading, we will focus on "Making Predictions and Learning Voice Print Match While Building Stamina."

In Writing, our focus will be seeing "Authors As Mentors" and exploring new forms of writing, including pattern books, lists and ABC books. In Math, we will extend the counting sequence to 20 and utilize strategies to count and build sets of 10 objects. Students will also build on their knowledge of numbers 1 through 10 to understand the numbers 6-10 as composed of a 5-group and some ones. We will also explore the attributes of triangles and hexagons.

Finally in Science, we will begin our Unit: "Observing Patterns: Objects," in which we will use our Five Senses to investigate and describe the physical properties of objects and discover the best uses for different materials.

We are looking forward to meeting with each of you during the week of October 7 for parent/teacher conferences!

The school year is off to a productive start! The students have a sound understanding of the routines, procedures, and behavior expectations. We will continue to refine these skills throughout the school year and gain an understanding of how we learn best in a calm and peaceful learning environment.

Throughout the month of September we will be working on sequencing stories during reading by using sentence starters such as first, next, then, after that, and last.


In writing we will continue to draft our personal narratives, familiarize ourselves with the writing process, and learn strategies that can help us when we get "stuck" and unsure of what to write about.

In math we will continue to add and subtract numbers within 20 using different strategies and learning to solve one and two-step word problems.

In social studies we are learning about 9 strategies we can use to help us solve small problems independently.

Hello Third Grade families!

We are becoming procedure experts and we have gotten knee deep into learning! In Reading, we have been learning many comprehension strategies to help us become better readers. Some examples are: making connections to our background knowledge and questioning. We are getting ready to begin our unit that focuses on fiction text and characters in text. Throughout this unit we will discuss fiction story elements and characters (use evidence from the text to infer setting, problem/solution, character traits, feelings, motives).

In Writing, we have been discovering ways to use writing to help us learn. We call this Writing to Learn. The students are realizing that it helps them solidify their learning in every subject. Organizational tools we have been using are Thinking Maps. We have also been working on our Slice of Life (personal narrative) to help us understand the writing process and all of its steps. Next, we will work on figurative language and write some poetry.

In math we have been plugging away at our multiplication strategies (equal groups, repeated addition, arrays, and skip counting. We have focused on multiplication problems involving 0-5, 9, and 10. We have been learning about the properties of multiplication (commutative, associative, distributive, identity and zero), and word problems involving multiplication and division.

Please study for at least ten minutes at home nightly to learn multiplication facts by heart. This is so important to prepare them for the rest of third grade and moving on into fourth and beyond. Students are expected to be masters of multiplication by the end of 3rd grade. In Science, we are watching our caterpillars grow into butterflies and will soon see them fly away while studying Life Cycles of plants and animals.

We are so excited to get to know your children more and more each day, and get to know you more as well. Please feel free to ask us questions or volunteer some time in the classroom!

Happy October! The students are finally settling in to 4th grade and working hard on our curriculum.

October will be a busy month in 4th grade.

In Reading we are working on comparing literary texts with a focus on character traits.

In Writing we are working on writing fictional short stories.

In Math we are working on multi-digit multiplication. Please make sure your child is practicing their multiplication facts every night! The expectation in 4th grade is that students have mastered their multiplication facts by the end of the school year.

In Science/Social studies, we learned how to be a good digital citizen in the online world. Students also learned about the solar system and created augmented reality models to showcase their knowledge. Next, we are learning all about energy.

Please remember to visit our classroom Class Dojo frequently for up-to-date information about what is going on during the week, field trips and important updates. Some students still do not have headphones, so please be sure to check with your child to see if they need a pair for school.

In music class we are working on becoming great ensembles this first semester. Teamwork is our focus to develop and foster community within each class. Students are starting to work using our Orff instruments. Older grades are finding technical challenges and lower grades are working on developing good instrumental technique.

Did you know that they are called *Orff* instruments because they are named after the famous composer Carl Orff? He designed the instruments after taking a trip to Africa where he was intrigued by the African Balafon-or xylophone. He returned to his home in Germany and designed the Orff instruments based on those from Africa. We have used them in schools ever since!

Younger students are experiencing movement and song. They are learning to move and create in their own way in the space. They are building confidence in singing alone and with others.

FitBits: News from the Foster P.E. Department!


August and September really flew by here in the gym with students completing units in collaboration, routines (rules and procedures) and beginning fitness and nutrition that will last the remainder of first trimester.


