March 2023 Hello Foster Families,

CMAS testing this year starts March 27, and runs through the end of April. CMAS is a yearly assessment which tests students in grades 3-8 on their understanding of Colorado State Standards for English Literary (reading and writing) and Mathematics. 5th and 8th graders are also assessed in Science. 3rd and 4th graders who are designated NEP (Non-English Proficient) and LEP (Limited English Proficient) and have been educated in a bilingual program are able to take the literacy test in Spanish (CSLA).

Assessment data are used to help schools and districts make adjustments to instruction and curriculum design, so it is very important for us to have your students in school and prepared to take the assessment. Please support us in helping your students be prepared by having a good night's sleep, eating breakfast, taking the assessment seriously, and working hard to do their best. Please do not schedule health appointments during your student's assessment times. If your student is sick, keep them home and call the office. If your student becomes injured in a way that could prevent them from taking the test, or if you have any other questions or concerns, please contact Ms. Shari at <u>scristbr@jeffco.k12.co.us</u>.

Preschool March Newsletter

Dear preschool families,

We would like to extend our most sincere apologies for the cancellation of our field trip to the Arvada Center. It was a District Wide weather policy that we were not expecting. We will try to reschedule it for a later date. We will keep you posted.

Inquiry Study 5: **Is What I Want, What I need?** We have had a slow start to Inquiry Study 5 due to delayed starts, field trip cancellation, etc. However, we have had discussions about money, how to earn money, reasons we save money, and spending money on various wants and needs. Students have gained some understanding about the differences between needs and wants. Students have been engaged in pretend play with money. The drama centers have been transformed so that students can act out buying and spending on food, a very important need. At the end of this unit, we would like to have a bazaar (market) where students can actually sell their artwork and crafts. Any money raised will go to a fundraiser that students vote on. For example, St. Jude's Children's Hospital or an animal shelter. We are still planning this event, but will give you more information as it develops. We are going to start our Inquiry Study 6: Living and Nonliving, How Do I Know? on March 27, 2023.

Literacy

Students will be learning our Estrellita segment #5, letters g, sonido fuerte como en "gato" g, sonido suave como en "gemelos", ch como en "chile", ñ como en "ñandú", v como en "vaca" y ll como en "llave". We encourage you to practice the sound chart with your students and find words, pictures, and items that start with the letter sounds. Some games you can play at home to reinforce phonological awareness are "teacher and student" where you are the student and your student is the teacher. They love this game in the classroom. For example, you can say, I'm going to tell you something that starts with g,g,g...and you are going to tell me if I'm right. Rhyming, segmenting words (breaking words into syllables) is still another skill we would like you to reinforce at home. Please keep reading to your child and focus on telling where they can find the title of the book, what is the job of the author, and illustrator? and front and back of the book.

Math

In math, students have been learning the names of the coins and like to sing the money song. They have also worked on making patterns with coins, sorting coins, playing Roll and Stack with coins, and experimenting with coin rubbings. Next time you are planning on going to the store, plan on making a grocery list to sort the family wants and needs. This activity will provide a real life example on how people plan to buy items they need and want.

Hello Kinder Families,

Wow, February sure raced by! It was filled with fun ~ celebrating the 100th Day with all the creative projects, sharing cards and treats on Valentine's Day. Also, we really appreciated seeing everyone at our Spring Parent/Teacher Conferences.



This month we will start our seventh module in **Reading and Writing** called **"Zoom In!"** Students will spend the first two weeks reading in Spanish with Ms. Alma and writing in English with Ms. Shannon. The last two weeks we will switch and students will do writing in Spanish and reading in English. The texts in this module inspire children to zoom in, whether it's exploring a fascinating corner of nature, like the world of ants, or appreciating beauty in everyday experiences, like a man strumming his guitar on the bus. Children will look closely, think differently, ask questions, and make connections.

In Math, our Unit, "Partners, Problem Drawings, and Tens" will focus on learning to: extend the counting sequence to 100

instantly recognize and represent numbers 6–10 as being composed of a 5–group and more ones (conceptual subitizing)

use concrete materials and drawings to compose and decompose numbers 11–19 into ten ones and some more and quantities 2–10 into partner numbers

identify which of two groups has more than (or fewer than or the same amount as) the other using matching, counting, and knowledge of number sequence

act out addition and subtraction situations, including when both addends are unknown, by representing quantities with math drawings and equations

We will begin our Science unit "Forces and Interactions: Pushes and Pulls". Students will learn that pushes and pulls can have different strengths and directions and also, that a bigger push or pull makes things speed up or slow down more quickly.

In Math, we are working on collecting and organizing data and we are learning about measuring lengths with non numeral length units, telling and writing time in hours and half-hours using analog and digital clocks and how to use geometric ideas of shape and fractions to describe the real world. At home, please continue to work on addition/subtraction facts and adding 10 to any number.

In Social Studies we will continue learning about notable people, places, holidays, and civic symbols.

Hello Third Grade Dual families,

Time is going by too quickly! We can't believe it is March. It was great sharing with you your child's growth during parent teacher confer-

ences. We had our first successful field trip to see the play Charlotte's Web. Our marble jar is almost full in Ms. Mari's class, and we've been toying with the idea of watching the animated movie Charlotte's Web. CMAS testing will begin at the end of March through April. We will send more information on that soon.

Here is what we are learning in class with Ms. Paola:

Reading: Over the next four weeks, in module seven our class will develop knowledge about people improving and strengthening their communities, with a focus on the nonfiction storytelling genre. We will read texts about individuals and groups that have made changes in their communities, both local and global. The children will also write a news report for an imaginary school newspaper.

Social Studies: Students in this unit use geographic and primary sources to learn about the characteristics of different regions and how culture is influenced by local geography. This foundation creates the "setting" for students to investigate change over time within the regional area of the unit. As students investigate change, they explore the roles of different people who impact the development of the region. Students illustrate and explain unique cultural elements of historic and modern Native American cultures. The areas of focus will be, San Luis Valley, Southwest (4 corners)

Ute/ Southern Ute, Mesa Verde, Utah, Arizona, New Mexico, Rio Grande headwaters, Mexican-American War, Sand Dunes art & agriculture.

SLD: In order to support our HMH unit for module 7 students will focus on their Spanish fluency and phonemic awareness. They will also review and practice the vocabulary from Arriba la lectura. The students are also focusing on the right pronunciation of Spanish words and phrases.

Here is what we are learning in class with Ms. Mari:

Writing: In module 7, titled Make A Difference, students will write an opinion essay. Students need to think about how students can make school a better place for everyone, and write an essay about a way students can help make their school better for everyone. Students will learn the difference between a fact and opinion, the attributes of opinion writing and the use of persuasive language. In addition, students need to know the grade level expectations for a paragraph and a multiparagraph essay. We will utilize the writing process: prewriting, drafting, revising, editing and publishing to write the essay. Some of the foundational skills we will focus on in this module are compound words, abbreviations, irregular plurals and words with the two different sounds for /oo/. There will be three spelling word lists and a quiz, and the fourth week will be a review of all three lists and a cumulative quiz. **Math:** In unit 7, we will explore fractions. Students will understand the meaning of fractions

and see that fractions must be equal parts of the same whole. They will represent fractions in various ways, including fraction bars, number lines, and fraction strips. Students will compare unit fractions and compare fractions with either the same numerator or the same denominator. Finally, students will be able to find equivalent fractions. In addition, we will review the last two units, word problems and polygons, to gain proficiency in the important concepts of those units.

ELD:

In English Language Development (ELD), we are building our listening, speaking and comprehension skills in English. We are using this time to reteach and deepen their knowledge of the module's vocabulary, generative vocabulary (prefixes and suffixes), grammar, and foundational skills.

• Daily reading is an important habit in 3rd grade. Please be sure to read every night, in both languages, with your child.

- Continue to practice math skills at home using IXL. Login information was sent home. Please let us know if you need it again.
- Library checkouts are now on Wednesday and Thursdays so please return books by the previous Tuesday.

• Please bring a healthy snack for your child or donate a healthy snack for 40 students. Students **MUST** come to school with their chromebooks fully charged each day. We have had several students come to school with Chromebooks not charged.

6th grade: We have been working on ecosystems with their relationships and this month we will start everything related to how living beings feed in the ecosystem, we will learn the concepts of Carnivores, Herbivores and omnivores and we will work recognizing how each of these interact with each other in the chain and food web.

7th grade: We are learning about the systems of the human body and the care that we must have to maintain adequate health and avoid diseases. This month we are learning the human excretory and respiratory system, where we will do laboratory practices to recognize tissues and functions of these systems and their organs.

8th grade: We will be learning about the properties of sound. We will carry out several experiments that show us how the propagation of this light is to be able to identify it in our daily life.

Hello familias, In my class we are currently working on...

6th grade: We are on Unit 4! We are working on dividing fractions. Our class chant for the next few weeks is keep, change and flip. This is the process we use to divide fractions. Our goals are to create tape diagrams to represent and solve problems asking "How many groups?"

7th grade: We are currently working on Unit 5 where we will be learning about rational number arithmetic! We will be interpreting signed numbers. We'll be learning how to write and solve equations to represent sums and differences of signed numbers.

8th grade: We are currently graphing linear equations and this is the second phase of Unit 4. We are learning about slopes and how to graph points. We are only a couple of lessons away from Unit 5.

6th Grade, 7th Grade and 8th Grade: We have started the new math tutoring program. Our goal is to improve the level of mathematics using fun and engaging tools. We will use the resources "building fact fluency" and "IXL". Both provide individualized and group opportunities that will allow students to improve in what they need. Moreover, your students can practice IXL at home. We just finished a diagnostic test and they have a report recommending what they need to practice.

6th Grade: Self-Awareness and Self-Care

We are working on our third unit of the year, Self-Awareness and Self-Care. In this unit. students learn about the different ways that young people develop and mature as they move from childhood to adolescence to adulthood, and how they can take care of themselves along this journey. By researching expert opinions from different cultures or regions and interviewing adults from their family or surroundings, students synthesize what they learn about human development to understand their own changing dynamics and needs.

7th Grade: Creating Community

We are starting our fourth unit of the year that focuses on how people participate in various types of communities as an individual citizen and as a member of a group. Students will publish a newspaper/magazine about a community's news, issues, and events.

8th Grade: The Story of the Americas

In our final unit of the year, students will investigate the impacts of colonialism on the peoples of the Americas through primary and secondary sources of informational texts, as well as images, artwork, maps, charts.

All Classes:

Spelling: Students are continuing to work on including accents in their writing.

Grammar:

Students in 7th and 8th grade are studying how to conjugate verbs in the imperfect tense. We use the imperfect tense to talk about repeated or continuous actions in the past. The imperfect is used when the past action doesn't have a definite beginning and definite end.

Students in 6th grade, we are moving from present tense verb conjugations to past tense. We will be studying how to conjugate regular preterite tense verbs. We use the preterite tense to talk about completed actions at specific times in the past. The preterite is used when the past action has a definite beginning and definite end.

Please remember that all middle school students have grammar practice for homework twice a week.


